

Dr. George B Inge, Murphy class of 1970, is a practicing fertility specialist in Mobile, Alabama. Dr. Inge graduated from the University of Alabama School of Medicine in 1977, and has been in practice for 42 years.

Dr. Inge completed his residency at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center. He also specializes in OB/GYN and currently practices at the Center for Reproductive Medicine and is affiliated with the Mobile Infirmary Medical Center, and the Fertility Institute of Northwest Florida in Gulf Breeze Florida.

Dr. Inge has held the positions of chief micro surgeon for infant infertility microsurgery and chief of OB/GYN service at the 130th Station Hospital in Heidelberg Germany, and received the rank of major in the US Army medical Corps. Dr. Inge received additional training and experience in advanced reproductive technology as a result of a Bourn Hall Clinical Fellowship in Cambridge, England, where many of the modern treatments for infertility were developed. He is a diplomat of the American Board of obstetrics and gynecology and is board certified in obstetrics and gynecology.

Professional accomplishments include chairman of the Alabama section of the American College of obstetrics and gynecology and selection to the Sessions Management Committee of the American Society for reproductive medicine. Professional memberships include the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology, the American Medical Association, American Society for Reproductive Medicine, the Medical Society of Mobile County, the Medical Association of Mobile County, the Medical Association of the State of Alabama, the European Society of Human Reproduction and Embryology, the Society of Reproductive Surgeons and the Alabama section of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

While a student at Murphy high school, George was a member of the Key Club, Ushers Club, Student Council, and the Interclub Council. He was also treasurer of the Student Council his junior year, and President of the Student Council his senior year. During his senior year, George was also a member of the Booster Club and a judge during Youth Appreciation Week.

George has been very active in the community over the years. George developed a passion for land in south central Alabama. He purchased land beginning in 1987 and, with the help of the Alabama Forestry Commission and the Natural Resource Conservation Service of the US Department of Agriculture, began a long journey which resulted in conversion of cut over and high graded problematic land into longleaf pine forests with the introduction of gopher tortoises and other plants and animals characteristic of this fire dominant diverse ecosystem. This helped to protect the water and facilitate hunting. George received Treasur Forest stewardship award as a result.

As a youth, George received the Eagle Scout honor from the Boy Scouts of America. As an adult, George continued his work with scouting which included being a Scoutmaster in Bayou La Batre. This work led to his receiving the national Eagle Scout Association Eagle Scout of the year award in the Mobile area Council, the Boy Scouts of America Whitney M Young award for

service to the underprivileged, and the St. George Award of the Boy Scouts of America presented by his church.

George is very strong in his faith, and has made seven or eight visits to Honduras on medical mission trips. George's family went on these trips with him, and this developed very strong family ties and developed strong relationships in Central America.

Dr. Inge was blessed by wonderful parents who set good examples of faith, hard work, humility, gratitude, and concern for their fellow man. Both parents are Murphy high school graduates who survived the Great Depression and World War II and talked about lessons learned regularly.

George and his wife, Jane, have been married since they were both 20 years old, and they have three daughters Eleanor Baker, Liz Ridgdell and Virginia Gordon.
